Arkansas Coronavirus Update

US death count due to Covid-19 is 231,671
today (Tues., Oct. 26th, 2020) with total cases at
9,004,393.

The report of Coronavirus updates has changed
from daily (M-F) to weekly. As of 1:30 p.m.
Tues., Oct. 26th, 2020 - there are **in the state of
Arkansas** 952 new cases. There are 1,696
deaths - up 20 from Monday; 676 hospitaliza-
tions - up 27 from Monday.

In White County - there are 1452 cases
(up 11% from last week) and there are 32
deaths, (no increase since last week) according
to the Ark. Dept. of Health.

As of Oct. 19th - Beebe has 18 active cases
and 238 cumulative cases; Cabot has 87 new
cases and 711 cumulative cases; and Searcy has
165 new cases and 632 cumulative cases. In
the **school districts**, as of Oct. 19th - Beebe has
296 cumulative cases, 24 new cases; Cabot has
977 cumulative cases in the school district with
118 new cases; Searcy has 620 cumulative cases
in the school district with 170 new cases accord-
ing to ACHI.net.

People who think they may have Covid-19
should call their health care providers as their
first step, according to the state Department of
Health.

A health care provider will decide if a test is
appropriate based on the symptoms and possi-
ble exposure to the coronavirus.

Arkansas Issue 1, Transportation Sales Tax Continuation Amendment (2020) Arkansas Issue 1, the Transportation Sales Tax Continuation Amendment, is on the ballot in Arkansas as a legislatively referred constitutional amendment on November 3, 2020.[1][2]

A "yes" vote supports continuing a 0.5% sales tax, with revenue dedicated to state and local highways, roads, and bridges, that would otherwise expire in 2023.

A "no" vote opposes continuing the 0.5% sales tax, thereby allowing the tax to expire once bond debt authorized in 2012 is repaid in 2023.

State Capitol Week in Review

LITTLE ROCK – The Legislative Council approved spending \$48.5 million in federal relief money to fund a grant program that will help tourism-related businesses adversely affected by the pandemic.

The grants will be available to small businesses that hire up to 250 full-time employees.

The program is called the Business Interruption Grant Program for the Arkansas Service and Hospitality Industries. An individual business can qualify for a grant of up to \$250,000. The Parks, Heritage and Tourism Department and the Department of Commerce will review grant applications.

Grants can be used to defray expenses caused by the need to mitigate covid-19, such as protective equipment, supplies needed to sterilize surfaces and plexiglass shields.

The grants also can be used for expenses caused by government order that interrupted business activity, whether it was a local government, the state or a federal mandate.

For example, a business that was forced to close may use the grants for rent or mortgage payments, franchise fees, insurance and payroll costs.

Grants may not be spent for certain expenses that include taxes, lost profits, entertainment or lobbying expenses, depreciation and severance pay.

The program will allocate 15 percent of the grants to businesses owned by minorities and women.

The application period is from November 16 and through November 25, with the goal of announcing recipients by late December.

Depending on the number of applicants, grants may be awarded on a prorated basis. In other words, applicants may not be awarded the entire amount for which they applied. One factor that the review committee will consider is the difference in the sales

tax that a business paid from March through September of last year, as compared with the same period in 2020.

The Legislative Council is the main committee of lawmakers that monitors state government operations during the interim between regular sessions.

At its most recent meeting, the Council considered a list of recommended expenditures from the CARES Act steering committee, a group of state officials appointed by the governor to review how best to spend \$1.25 billion federal aid. The federal aid was made available after Congress approved the CARES Act in late March. CARES stands for the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act.

One of the larger expenditures approved was for \$25 million to match federal dollars and pay unemployment insurance benefits to workers who have lost their jobs.

The Legislative Council also voted to use \$4.24 million for rental assistance, as well as \$5 million for suicide prevention and mental health treatment for veterans.

Also, about \$5.5 million in relief funds will go to small-scale meat processing plants.

The purpose is to help smaller businesses while strengthening our capacity to withstand any further disruptions in the supply chain in the meat industry.

According to the state budget director, Arkansas now has about \$81.6 million remaining from the original \$1.25 billion the state received from the CARES Act.

The Council approved using \$1.82 million for the Arkansas Hunger Relief Partnership.

Also, lawmakers approved using \$5 million for social services in high poverty areas. The state Human Services Department will put the money in its Community Outreach Investment program.

In the 2019 Regular Session, the General Assembly made the first effort to reorganize state government in 50 years. We are now seeing the results of that effort through millions in savings.

The 92nd General Assembly passed Act 910, known as the "Transformation and Efficiencies Act." Since it took effect cabinet secretaries have been asked to find opportunities to improve their departments in the three ways:

1. Efficiencies
2. Improved managerial support
3. Improved delivery of services to citizens

One way departments have accomplished this is by focusing on location sharing when possible and evolving to a new work environment that is less expensive and ensures less square footage. The Department of Transformation and Shared Services reports that from July 1, 2019, to March 4, 2020, departments have realized more than \$920,000.00 in savings on rent and 80,282 square feet of reduction in space.

A second way departments have improved is through budget reduction. In the balanced budget presented for year two of the biennium without additional funding, there is a \$10 million reduction in the performance fund. This fund is set-aside and available to supplement department budgets as needed as a result of their annual performance reviews.

Departments have also reduced the number of filled positions by 310 since July 1, 2019. This was accomplished by finding new ways to improve delivery and a commitment to shared services. No jobs

Council Holds October Meeting

The Beebe City Council met Monday night, Oct. 26th for their regular monthly meeting. The council approved the following:

- The recommendations from the Planning & Zoning Commission to approved two issues - rezoning from R1 to R4 off Twin Lakes Blvd. (Ord. 2020-15) and rezoning from R1 to C2 along Hwy. 67-167 (Ord. 2020-16) by

T.J. Ashley.

- The mayor told the council that an amount of \$289,000 will be the city's share of the Care's Act distribution of \$75 million statewide to cover money spent on Covid-19 expenses.

- Ark. Rural Connect program to expand broadband - which will enable the state to improve the availability of broadband. The city will apply for this program within the city limits and the Beebe School District will apply for outside the city limits.

- Approved spending \$5500. for a 42" brush Wolf 4200 x from Henard Equipment of Searcy.

- Approved moving James Squires from head of the Street Dept. to the Code Enforcement position as Milton McCulloch will be retiring in March. And approved placing Nick Smith of the Street Dept. to the head of the Street Dept. Squires and Smith will each be paid \$45,000 yr. with family insurance.

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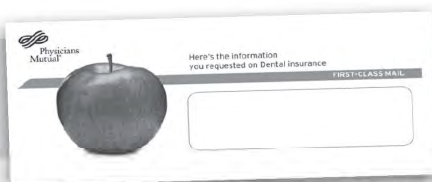

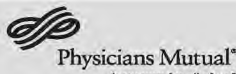

God’s List of Sins

There are several passages which describe Christian sins. One is Galatians 5:16-21. A special one that I want to cover is found in Proverbs. Please remember, with the exception of Romans 1:18 and following, most of the sins described in the Bible (unless the context indicates otherwise) are sins of believers. Proverbs is addressed to the believer, and in Proverbs 6:16-19, we have sins committed by believers.

Before we cover this passage, think of your list of the world’s worst sins. Everyone has a list. When I was an unbeliever, number one on my list was “kiss and tell.” I thought the worst people in the world were the ones who were guilty of this. In the crowd that I ran with, if anyone started to brag about his girl friends, we threw him out immediately. He was no gentleman. The second thing on my scale of values was never to welch on an obligation; and the third was to level with people - to be honest and not hypocritical. Everyone has some concept of what is right and what is wrong. Let’s see how your list lines up with God’s list. Here in Proverbs, Chapter 6, are seven sins that God hates.

These six things doth the Lord hate: yea, seven are an abomination unto him (Prov. 6:16).

Now, stand by for some shocks. Out of these seven sins, three are sins of the tongue. So, that may ruin your list right now.

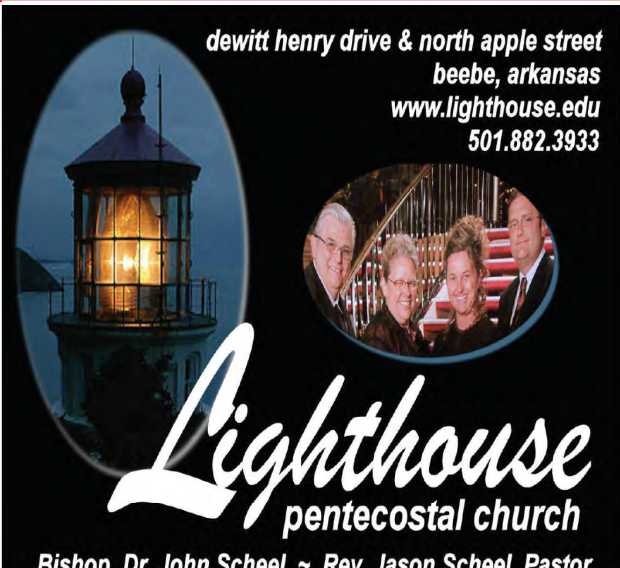
A proud look, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood (Prov. 6:17).

A “proud look” is number one on the list. Some of the worst Christians I have ever known were the ones who thought they were the most spiritual. They were the kind of Christians who observed two or three taboos, and my, how proud they were! They gave up this or that and they did it for the Lord. “A proud look!”

The second one - “a lying tongue.” This is also high on the list.

“Hands that shed innocent blood” is murder. By the way, Christians DO commit murder. It doesn’t happen every day, but it does happen. I know of one case specifically where a Christian did commit murder. However, he did not start there. He worked into it by getting out of fellowship on a little thing and then staying out of fel-

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lowship for a long time. He just happened to have a fiery temper, and it caught up with him.

An heart that deviseth wicked imaginations, feet that be swift in running to mischief (Prov. 6:18).

Do you ever think up ways to torture people you don’t like? “An heart that deviseth wicked imaginations” is a sin of mental attitude.

“Feet that be swift in running to mischief” are trouble-makers or obstructionists.

A false witness that speaketh lies, and he that soweth discord among brethren (Prov. 6:19).

“A false witness that speaketh lies” is a person who is deliberately perjuring himself, lying about someone else under oath.

Finally, “he that soweth discord among the brethren” is the story of what goes on in so many local churches today.

Now, there is a list for you! It gives you an idea of what is as far as God is concerned. This Bible list of sins doesn’t cover them all, but it does give you a start. Sin hits everyone, and the Old Sin Nature is the source of all these things.

The OSN is the Culprit

In order to complete the background for Rebound, we should look into some of the characteristics of the Old Sin Nature. Remember, with the exception of Jesus Christ, every person born into the human race possesses an OSN. This is standard equipment for every believer, since it is something that we do not lose at the point of salvation. This is the reason why no Christian will ever be perfect in this life. Perfection or ultimate sanctification comes with a resurrection body beyond the grave, but not in time.

If you think about the OSN, you will agree that there are strengths that each Christian has - sins that you would never commit. Then there are weaknesses - sins that you have trouble with - are tempted by. We all have sins that tempt us and sins that never tempt us.

Please remember to have a little compassion when you see someone else step out of line. You, too, have an Old Sin Nature! Just because it doesn’t happen to be your day to be out of line, it doesn’t mean that you will be in line tomorrow. One of the great principles of contact with other believers and fellowship with them is “Live and let live!” This is the concept that everyone must handle his own sins before the Lord. There is no place in the Christian way of life for spiritual bullying or trying to run the lives of others. The people who do that, generally, are people who have made a mess of their own lives. They have become “an expert” through failure, so now they are trying to tell everyone else how to succeed.

The Bible is not a history book or science book, but it is accurate in all those areas. But its purpose is not history or science. The Bible tells the story of Redemption. The Bible is designed to direct praise, honor, and glory to God. However, the Bible is also a great gift from God to man. The Creator has given His creatures a manual which will bring great joy and peace to the one who follows it. Again, if followed, this manual will first keep the creature from great pain and misery. From the beginning of creation, God has been very clear about the conditions under which we would be kept from harm. He repeatedly told us that our blessing and protection would be conditional. We would be safe and blessed if we obeyed Him. Deuteronomy 28 lists curse after curse after curse if we fail to obey Him. Faith demands that we believe that promise to be true. God has put physical laws into place. If we break them, we bear the consequences. God has put spiritual laws into place. If we break them, we bear the consequences for that also. Often, these natural consequences are enough discipline to get us to change our behavior without any extra consequences in the form of punishment. However, sometimes that is not enough for some of us. Sometimes real punishment is needed.

In our journey through the Scriptures stopping to examine God's questions, we come to the 11th chapter of Isaiah. Isaiah 1:5-7 describes Israel as a nation that does not have to take Deuteronomy 28 by faith. Israel has found out the hard way that God keeps His promises. It can also apply to rebellious individuals. Here a rebellious person is described as one who has been beaten by the rod of God as punishment for his rebellion. He has been beaten from head to toe. His body is described as having no place left to beat that has not already been beaten. There is no place left to stripe with a whip. His wounds are described as unhealed. The assumption is not that they are fresh; having recently been received but, rather they are the result of long-term, on-going punishment. His wounds will be forever not healed because he continues to live in rebellion to God and continually receives new strokes of the rod. The point here is a very sad one.
