New applicants may anticipate being placed on a waiting list. The CSFP food package contains a variety of nutritious food to eligible seniors. ORDINANCE NO. 2023-01

AN ORDINANCE TO WAIVE THE REQUIREMENT OF COMPETITIVE BIDDING FOR THE PURCHASE OF A POLICE VEHICLE; **DECLARING AN EMERGENCY;** AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

WHEREAS, Arkansas Code Annotated §14-58-303 require competitive bidding for the purchase by the City of Beebe, Arkansas, of supplies, apparatus, equipment, materials, and services the cost of which is excess of \$35,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the City of Beebe, Arkansas, must have police vehicles with necessary accessories in its possession for use on a daily basis; and

WHEREAS, the City of Beebe, Arkansas, therefore is presently in need of a police vehicle (the "Vehicle") to be accessorized for emergency services, the cost of which may exceed \$35,000.00; and

that due to the limited in supply stock placing the matter for bid would unduly delay the purchase of the Vehicle and would likely result in the City of Beebe not obtaining the best vehicle necessary which could be accessorized for the purposes needed; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by the City Council for the City of Beebe, Arkansas,

WHEREAS, the City of Beebe has contracted several suppliers regarding the purchase of the Vehicle and the City Council for the City of Beebe has determined that there exists one (1) supplier, namely Frank Fletcher CDJR, located in Jonesboro, Arkansas, which has on hand the specific type of vehicle which can be accessorized as needed and wanted by the City of Beebe, Arkansas; and

WHEREAS, it has, therefore, been determined by the City Council for the City of Beebe, Arkansas, that competitive bidding, therefore, is not feasible or practical;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Beebe, Arkansas:

- 1. That it is not feasible or practical to require competitive bidding for the procurement of a police Vehicle with the necessary accessories from the Frank Fletcher CDJR by the City of Beebe, Arkansas, as defined by Arkansas Code Annotated § 14-58-303 and as held by the Supreme Court of Arkansas in Klinger v. City of Favetteville, 293 Ark. 128, 732, S.W. 2d 859 (1987).
- 2. That, therefore, the requirement of competitive bidding for the present procurement by the City of Beebe, Arkansas, of the following equipment:

One (1) New Dodge Durango, White Police Vehicle, as set forth in more detail in the Retail Order For A Motor Vehicle and Order Summary attached hereto and incorporated collectively herein as Exhibit "1".

- 3. Hat the iviayor and cier of the city of Decoe, Paranisas, shall have e given the necessary and requisite authority to contract on behalf of the City of Beebe, Arkansas, of said Vehicle and to sign necessary documents on behalf of the City of Beebe, Arkansas, without
- 4. That the procurement of the Vehicle with accessories is necessary for the health and safety of the Citizens of the City of Beebe, Arkansas, and emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.
